

City Council adopts new *Growth Management Plan*



CITY OF GRAHAM LEAF COLLECTION

The City of Graham is ready to begin fall and winter leaf collection. Collection crews will begin on **Monday, October 28, 2013 thru Friday, January 31, 2014**. Residents are encouraged to use this “loose leaf” collection service because of landfill disposal regulations. **During this time, call-in service will not be available.**

Residents should pile loose leaves behind the curb or on the shoulder of streets without curb and gutter by 8:00 a.m. in order to ensure collection. Leaves should not be piled in the street, drainage ditches, or over water meters. Leaves which contain gravel, glass, or other solid matter will not be collected. Should more frequent leaf collection be desired, residents are required to place leaves in suitable containers and set them out with their regular yard waste. **Bagged leaves will not be collected.**



Questions concerning leaf collection should be directed to the Sanitation Division at 570-6709 or 570-6710. **Please do not call requesting special pick-up, crews work set areas and schedules.**

DON'T FEED THE GREASE GOBLIN!!!

DO:

- Pour oil & grease in collection containers.
- Remove oil & grease from utensils, equipment & food preparation areas with towels & scrapers.
- Put food scraps in collection containers.
- Keep grease out of wash water



DO NOT:

- Pour grease & oils down the drain.
- Use hot water to rinse grease off the surfaces.
- Wash fryers, griddles, pots, pans and plates with water until grease and oil have been removed.



NC Stream Watch helps protect our most precious resource, our water, by removing litter and keeping an eye on water and stream bank conditions. The sooner cleanup crews can get to the site, the easier it is to minimize the impacts different types of pollution have on our waters. Anyone can form a Stream Watch group of two or more people. Clean waterways are as important as safe neighborhoods. The quality of water in our streams affects the quality of life for all living things. Those in the best position to notice the signs of a stream's distress are its neighbors, the people who live along its banks or use its waters. The realization that local residents are best suited to keep an eye on their nearby waterways is what prompted North Carolina to begin Stream Watch.

RECYCLE CLOTHING, SHOES & OTHER TEXTILES

Drop off your used textiles in a Planet Aid bin. You'll reduce the amount of waste going to our landfill and have a tax deductible donation. The City is hosting three Planet Aid bins. The clothing, shoes and textiles that are collected by Planet Aid, a non-profit, are reused by individuals or recycled into other products, such as insulation and carpeting. FLU SEASON IS FAST APPROACHING

Don't let the bug catch you. It's that time again!!

Flu activity most commonly peaks in the U.S. in January or February. However, seasonal flu activity can begin as early as October and continue to occur as late as May. The CDC recommends a yearly flu vaccine for everyone 6 months of age and older as the first and most important step in protecting against this serious disease.

While there are many different flu viruses, the flu vaccine is designed to protect against the three main flu strains that research indicates will cause the most illness during the flu season. Getting the flu vaccine as soon as it becomes available each year is always a good idea and the protection you get from vaccination will last throughout the flu season. If you are sick with the flu, stay home from work or school to prevent spreading influenza to others. Flu vaccines are offered in many locations, including doctor's offices, clinics, health departments, pharmacies and college health centers, as well as by many employers and even in some schools. So take that first step and protect yourself by getting your flu shot early.



As of July 1, 2012, Alamance County banned home electronics from its landfill. The City of Graham Sanitation Department is not responsible for the collection of these items during the weekly curbside pickup. Residents can dispose of these items at the Alamance County Landfill or an e-waste recycling site.

Among the prohibited items are: Televisions, VCRs, Stereos, tape players, radios, fax machines, DVD players, CD players, telephones and rechargeable batteries, personal computers, desktops, servers, laptops, docking stations, automated typewriters, copy machines, CD-ROM drives, hard drives and modems, mobile phones, MP3 players, PDAs, portable handheld calculators and electronic games, uninterruptible power supplies, printed circuit boards, routers, power and network cables, network hubs, controllers switching boxes and telephone systems.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION

It will be held October 19th from 8 am-1 pm. The location is at the Burlington Fire Training Facility at 100 Stone Quarry Rd. Haw River. They are accepting more than just paint related materials and pesticides, including: household cleaners, drain openers, brake fluid, antifreeze, filters, gasoline, batteries, pool chemicals, mercury, propane cylinders (grill & camp size only), weed killers, acids, oven cleaners, disinfectants, varnishes, thinners, fluorescent tubes, spray paint, latex and oil based paint. HOLIDAY GARBAGE SCHEDULES

Thanksgiving Holidays : There will be no garbage collection on Thursday, November 28 & Friday 29. Wednesday & Thursday routes will be collected on Wednesday, November 27th. Friday routes will be collected Monday December 2.

Christmas Holidays: December 25, 26, 27, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. No garbage will be collected on these days. Tuesday and Wednesday routes will be collected on Tuesday, December 24. Thursday and Friday routes will be collected Monday December 30.

There will be no yard waste collection from December 23, 2013 through January 3, 2014.

New Year's Day: January 1, 2014, Wednesday. No garbage collection on Wednesday January 1, 2014. Wednesday and Thursday routes will be collected on Thursday January 2, 2014.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY, SMOKE & CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS

- Use electrical devices safely to prevent fires. Extension cords must be rated for the power used by the device. Also, extension cords must never run inside walls or under rugs or furniture and should not be used as a long term solution.
- Never put clothing on lamps, as this can cause a fire. Also, never use lamps without shades as they might fall and start a fire.
- Properly installed and maintained smoke alarms are very important and significantly increase your chances of surviving a deadly home fire. Whether you're awake or asleep, a working smoke alarm is constantly on alert scanning the air for fire and smoke.
- Carbon monoxide is a toxic gas, but being colorless, odorless, tasteless, and initially nonirritating, it is very difficult for people to detect. It is often produced by older motor vehicles and other gasoline powered tools, heaters, and cooking equipment. Carbon monoxide poisoning can be prevented by early detection with the use of household carbon monoxide detectors.
