MAKE NC COUNT CENSUS 2020

Census Day is observed nationwide. When you respond to the census, you'll tell the Census Bureau where you live as of April 1, 2020. Census data is used to bring over \$675 billion of your tax dollars back to your community. Funding for health care programs (Medicaid and Medicare), infrastructure programs (Highway Planning and Construction Grants and Community Development Block Grants), child services (Foster Care, Title I Education Grants, National School Lunch Program), and more rely on Census data. Census data is also used to support preparation for local planning for schools, roads, water/sewer, and electric needs. Businesses use Census data to determine where to place stores, assess potential workforce, and evaluate markets. Future funding and planning in your community depends on accurate Census data.

WHO IS COUNTED IN THE CENSUS?

Everyone. The Census counts everyone living in the United States, regardless of citizenship status or age. To learn more, <u>www.2020census.gov</u>

Earlier this year, the City of Graham was selected as one of six communities from a competitive application process for acceptance into the Downtown Associate Community Program (DAC) coordinated under the NC Main Street and Rural Planning Center at the North Carolina Department of Commerce. This allows NC Main Street and Rural Planning Center staff to work with the City's Downtown Development Coordinator to build a sustainable, organizational foundation and conduct economic development planning. The partnership will strengthen downtown development efforts over the course of the next three years before the City is eligible to be designated as a Main Street community. As the weather warms up, the City of Graham would like to remind you to keep your yards and vacant lots mowed. The City's ordinance states that weeds, grass or other noxious growth cannot be in excess of 18 inches. If the City has to send a mowing violation, the owner of the property has 10 days to have it mowed. If within 10 days the property has not been mowed, the City shall have the grass cut at the owner's expense. The cost, in addition to an administrative fee of \$50.00, will then become a lien on the property unless paid in full within 30 days.

Pet Waste

As Spring approaches, keep in mind it is unlawful to not clean up after your pet on any street, sidewalk or publicly owned park. Dog waste is raw sewage and carries many harmful microorganisms that can be transmitted from pet waste to humans. Scoop the poop, bag it, and place it in the trash. Let's all do our part to keep Graham safe and clean!

NO FOG, NO CLOG...Keep Fats, Oils and Greases Out of the Sewer!

You can help prevent sewer overflows by following a few simple suggestions:

- Never pour grease down sink drains or into toilets.
- Scrape grease and food scraps into a can or the trash for disposal or recycling (where available).
- Put baskets or strainers in sink drains to catch food scraps and other solids, and then empty them into the trash.

Be Stormwater SMART! Recycle your Grass

WHY DOES IT MATTER?

Grass clippings and bits of leaves that are blown into the street after lawn maintenance can be just as bad as other forms of litter. They clog up gutters and storm drains, and what doesn't get stuck ends up in the nearest waterway (stream, pond, lake, and/or river) causing further problems. Any material (litter, grass clippings, leaves, etc.) in the storm drains reduces the amount of stormwater that can move through the drain system. Stormwater that should move quickly through the system may begin to back up; causing high water on roads or other, more hazardous, flooding situations.

Yard wastes contain an abundance of nutrients from fertilizer and natural sources; however, sometimes too much of a good thing may be harmful. When these wastes decompose, the nutrients fuel excessive and uncontrolled growth of aquatic weeds and algae, and offset water conditions which can lead to fish kills.

Always have your soil tested and only apply organic, slow-release, or water insoluble fertilizers.

Herbicides and insecticides remain on the grass for some time, and some make the clippings unsuitable for mulch, so it's important to cut it and leave it when you use weed killers. Too much herbicide can burn the lawn, kill nearby plants, and contaminate waterways. Instead of repeated whole- lawn application of weed killers, try a one-time preemergent weed killer and spot application if your lawn has only a few weeds.

MAINTAINING YOUR LAWN

To maintain your lawn properly, mow high and mow often, so that you only take off about 1/3 of the length of the grass. This will result in an attractive, neatly trimmed lawn, and clippings will disappear when they filter down to the soil. To shade the soil, cool the roots, and block weed growth, most lawns should be mowed 2-3" high especially in summer.

Controlling watering rates will help your lawn grow at manageable levels and still stay healthy. Don't water until the lawn is dry. If it turns blue-green or gray, or if footprints don't spring back, it's time to water. Provide about an inch at a time for clay soils. If managed carefully, water will soak four to six inches down, just right for building healthy root systems and greener growth. Early morning watering conserves water by preventing evaporation.

SO WHAT SHOULD BE DONE WITH CLIPPINGS?

Leave clippings on the lawn and sweep any that fall on paved surfaces back onto the lawn where they will naturally decompose and fertilize. You can also rake and blow clippings into a compost pile. If you use a lawn maintenance company, please be sure they do not blow or dump yard wastes down the storm drain inlets.

Remember, there is no treatment or filtering of stormwater between the drain on your street to the nearest body of water. Even though grass clippings, leaves, and soil are natural forms of debris, when they are put into the storm drain they can destroy the balance of our waterways. Storm drains are not garbage disposals!



Mercury Education

Many household items, such as appliances, batteries, electronics, jewelry, lightbulbs and thermometers may contain traces of Mercury. Please recycle mercury-containing products rather than disposing of them in regular household trash. Recycling mercury-containing products is one of the best ways to help prevent mercury releases to the environment by keeping these products out of landfills and incinerators. Once landfilled, mercury from the products may end up in groundwater, and potentially in sources of drinking water. Once incinerated, mercury may end up in the air.
