## Graham-Mebane Lake End-of-Year Report **Graham Recreation and Parks Department**


## Warden's Summary of 2023

Public use of the Lake continues to grow. We traditionally use customer visitation, boat launches, and gross revenue to measure growth - all increased this year. General fishing and boating remain the most popular use of the Lake, making up just over half of lake revenue, down from a non-Covid high of over 75% just seven years ago. Participation in new programs such as Lake Cruises and Paddle programs show that a more diverse use of the Lake is popular and profitable.

However, the growth in Lake use has overloaded the infrastructure. Inadequate vehicle parking and an outdated marina building have been issues for years, but are now over-shadowed by a shortage of boat dock capacity. We do not have the docking space necessary for our Lake vessels and customers' vessels. This is our most-pressing issue.

Bass fishing remains very good at the Lake while crappie and catfish fishing are average. Bass fishing draws anglers from not only across Alamance County, but also from the nearby large population centers. I have spoken with anglers that drive 1½ to 2 hours to fish here.

We took the first step forward in shoreline stabilization and water quality improvement with the Habitat Enhancement Program partnership with NC Wildlife.



The Lake hit a new high in revenue this year, up 7.5% over last year's record high.

While looking through the end-of-year data, I found some information that I believe portrays the current state of the Lake operation. My comments are in italics.

- In the last 15 years, Total Revenue has increased by 90% (\$34,000 to \$65,000); Customers are increasingly willing to spend money to recreate at the Lake;
- Lake revenue required to fund its budget has increased from \$22,000 to \$50,000 in 16 years;

- The Lake is increasingly able to assist in funding it's budget;
- User Fee revenue is leveling off averaging \$35,000/year over the last three years; Boating and bank fishing trips have reached the point where increased visits will only come with changes to infrastructure;

**Passive Visitors:** 

Non-User Fee revenue (rentals, cruises, programs, bait, etc.) has more than doubled in the last 5 years -\$13,000 to \$29,000; A large part of the Lake's revenue growth is from serving new customers.

#### Other 2023 Highlights:

- Three PT Lake Attendants were added to the lake staff. They were needed to fill holes in the work schedule and to work with vessel renters on rules, safety, waivers, and equipment.
- NC Wildlife fisheries biologists performed a crappie survey in November. The initial results indicate no change in the crappie fishery – the Lake is still over-crowded with 6" to 8" crappie. A marked increase in harvest is the only prescription for this issue.
- Due to the increasing fishing pressure (measured by number of boat launches) we continue to monitor the health of the largemouth bass fishery. This year, bass brought to us for pictures or weighing have been healthy, robust, and without stress sores, indicating the fishery remains healthy. NC Wildlife plans to survey largemouth bass in Spring 2024, which will give us a professional opinion of the fishery.
- The Lake water level stayed at full pool until August when heat and little rain began to drop the level to 2.5' below full pool by early December. Two heavy rains a week apart brought the lake back to full pool two weeks later.

In addition to the Lake Warden's 2,080 full-time hours worked, the Assistant Lake Wardens logged 1,025 hours, and Lake Attendants 3,225 hours, for a total of 6,300 hours worked. Lake Attendants working vessel rentals or paddle programs worked 460 hours. The Lake was open 230 days (~2,700 hours) this year.

#### 2023 Programs and Events at Graham-Mebane Lake

This is the second year of the expanded **Big Bass Tournament** (BBT). The number of entrants (68) remained steady as did the monthly prizes of an Annual Permit and fishing "swag" from sponsors. The additional of the Second Chance Tournament continues to grow in popularity.

The **Second Chance Tournament**, a subset of the BBT, tracks an entrant's heaviest bass caught throughout the year. The Top 8 leaders that do not win a monthly competition get their own tournament in early October. That tournament winner gets the chance to compete in the BBT Fish-Off. The goals of this tournament are to provide a second path into the BBT Fish-Off for those who were not able to win a month, raise interest in the BBT, and generate additional revenue. Over two-thirds of the BBT entrants entered Second Chance.

This year the Lake partnered with the NC Wildlife Resources Commission on a Five-Year Habitat Enhancement Program. The objectives of this program are to enhance habitat for the fisheries of the Lake, improve angler satisfaction, and stimulate the public to participate in habitat improvement projects. An additional objective for Graham-Mebane Lake is to initiate a shoreline stabilization program that will decrease shoreline erosion and the resultant muddy water and lake sedimentation.



To meet objectives, the

Program has and will continue to seek angler input into enhancement measures, establish native aquatic vegetation at 40+ sites, add artificial habitat, and fell shoreline trees to give anglers short-term habitat angling opportunities. This year, 20 protected and 46 unprotected vegetation sites were constructed and 1,797 native plants were planted.

The single-day **Graham-Mebane Lake Bass Tournament** is held on the last Saturday in March. 17 boats participated this year with a prize total of \$1,275. The Lake's Admin fee was \$425. The tournament has been popular.



The Lake held four evening **Catfish Tournaments** this summer with an average of 65 entrants per tournament, an ideal amount

for the fishing area and resources. These tournaments remain quite popular for families as well as the more seasoned anglers. Labor costs were \$230 while revenue was \$580 (per tournament); keeping the program profitable.

Youth Fishing Day is a free fishing event for kids ages 4 to 15. The goal is to interest youth (and parents) in fishing. T-shirts, a SnoBall, and a fishing-oriented goody bag are given to the attendees and 15 fishing rods are raffled off. Attendance was 75+. The Marketing and Programs Divisions of the GRPD assist with Youth Fishing Day and Family Day at the Lake.

**Family Day at the Lake** was a bust this year. The date was moved to the second Saturday in June, but had a similar number of attendees as last year. Approximately 85% of pre-registered participants did not attend. The event was evaluated and will be modified in the future.



This year, **Alamance Creek Week** was blended into the Youth Fishing Day event. Danica Heflin, the Environmental Programs Coordinator for Stormwater SMART, talked with participants about how water quality affects the animals that live in it. Hands-on with the turtles (gently) was a huge success.

The eighth year of the **Vessel Rental Program** was slightly better than last year. Expenses were lower as additional vessels were not purchased but increases in repair and replacement costs is expected in the future.

Two Lake Attendants were hired to work this program on weekends and holidays, relieving pressure on the Attendants in the marina. This has improved customer service and increased cleanliness of the vessels.

After a full year of having four jon boats available for rent, jon boat rentals increased from 40% to 55% of all vessel rentals. Two additional johnboats are needed to meet demand but dock and tie-up space is already over capacity. This past year, the dock space traditionally used for the Warden boat was used for jon boats with the Warden boat moved to the Pontoon boat space. With the completion of the Pontoon boat renovation, this will not be possible in the future meaning dock space traditionally used by boaters will be reduced to accommodate jon boats. Funding for a slip dock will be requested in the CIP for FY'24-'25.

A kayak **Paddle Program** was piloted this year. Seven Introduction to Paddling classes were offered with 42 customers participating. Staff will evaluate the program and explore expanding options in 2024.

**Non-Motorized Boat** (kayak/canoe) use of the Lake remained popular and slightly increased over last year. 771 customers launched their own boats, bringing in \$4,500. In July, net profit from the Non-Motorized Boat launching User Fees (not including the Vessel Rental program) paid-off the kayak launch purchased in 2018. Though the launch was purchased with CIP funds, it has been staff's goal to "pay for" this asset.

Lake Cruises began in October. Renovation of the pontoon boat took place throughout the spring and summer. Removal of the old flooring adhesive was a time-consuming project conducted by staff in an effort to reduce costs. Scheduling a vendor to re-install the engine, steering wheel and controls was difficult.

100 customers enjoyed one of fifteen 45-minute cruises. Staff will evaluate and expand the program in 2024 and will plan additional renovations.

Graham-Mebane Lake participates in the NC Wildlife Resources Commission's **Community Fishing Program**. The Commission provides four solar-powered fish feeders to attract fish to the bank fishing area.
The Lake purchases the fish food and maintains the feeders. We also participate in the Commission's **Tackle Loaner Program**. Beginning anglers of all ages may borrow a rod and reel while they fish at the lake.

**Fishing clubs** hold single-day tournaments at the Lake in spring and fall. Eleven tournaments were held in 2023, totaling 130 boats. Four of those tournaments had a winning bag (total weight of 5 bass) of over 24 pounds – a very nice metric for us. Due to parking issues, we restrict the number of tournament boats to 20 per day. Clubs must schedule the tournaments and pay general user fees. Tournaments are not held in June, July, and August to prevent fish loss in live wells.


The Lake partners with several local entities as an Emergency Training location. The Dive Team and Canine Rescue Team from the Alamance Co. Rescue Unit and the Alamance Co. Emergency Management agency use the Lake for realistic, hands-on training. Most training sessions occur when the Lake is closed, but for more realistic experience for the teams, customers, and staff, we occasionally allow training on weekends so staff and customers are able to experience what may happen when actual emergencies occur.


#### Charts, Tables, and Graphs

A note on the two equations included in some of the graphs. The top is the equation for the slope of the black line on the graph – the trend line. Lake staff is interested in the *m* value, which expresses the change on the left or y-axis for every step we move to the right on the bottom or x-axis.

The  $R^2$  value indicates how well the trend line approximates the data, or how much of the change on the y-axis (m) is attributed to the year-to-year change (x-axis). An  $R^2$  value above 0.7 (or 70%) means that what is measured on the y-axis is adequately explained by the change on the x-axis (or at least 70% of the change). A value less than 0.7 indicates other factor(s) are involved.  $R^2$  values of graphs that attempt to predict human behavior are usually below 0.5.


Boat launches bounced back from last year. The trend (the *m* in the slope equation) is an increase of 100 boats per year since 2008. The R<sup>2</sup> value of 0.52 indicates factors other than growth is affecting boat launching, (i.e. weather, water conditions, fuel costs, launch ramps, etc.) but also that the trend (the increase of 100 boats/year) has some accuracy since it concerns human behavior.





Lake **Visits** also rebounded from last year. Motorized boaters and bank anglers led the increase. The growth rate of over 500 visitors per year since 2008 is supported by the R<sup>2</sup> value of 0.71.

Lake **Revenue** peaked again in 2023 for the fourth year in a row. This was led by increases in tournaments, paddle programs, and bait sales. The slope equation shows an increase of \$2,000/yr. since 2008; which agrees with the actual Revenue increase of 90% (\$31,000) over the last 15 years.

## Accessible Parks (AP) Grant Program

Maximize Access to Recreation

The NC Division of Parks & Recreation has a new funding opportunity available: <a href="the-Accessible Parks">the Accessible Parks</a> (AP) Grant Program. The Accessible Parks Grant Program provides \$12.5 million in matching grants for parks & recreation for the construction of special facilities or adaptation of existing facilities that meet the unique needs of persons living with disabilities or that enable them to participate in recreational and sporting activities, regardless of their abilities. This program is administered through the Division and PARTF. The purpose of the Accessible Parks Grant is to maximize access to recreation.

#### Eligible Applicants include:

• NC Counties, Municipalities, and Public Authorities (as defined in G.S. 159-7)

#### Eligible Projects include:

- Development Projects that meet the unique needs of persons living with disabilities or that enable them to participate in recreational and sporting activities.
  - o Construction of special facilities
  - Adaptation of existing facilities
- Land Acquisition is not eligible.
- Applicants may apply for an active PARTF site but must request funding for different facilities.
- A facility previously funded with PARTF assistance and still under the 25-year restriction, may be eligible to receive AP funds if:
  - Said facility was funded with PARTF assistance prior to the 2012 funding cycle.
  - The proposed update / renovation will create a facility that <u>maximizes</u> accessibility.
  - Contact your RRS Regional Consultant to discuss the proposed project and confirm eligibility.
