Facility Updates:

Recreation Center:



We had really nice weather this October – only a few days of light rain. Fishing was average, but passive visitation was very good for this late in the year. Vessel rentals, paddle tours, and lake cruises brought people out to enjoy the lake before winter sets in.

October Lake Highlights

- Our last Kayak Paddle Tour of the year was on the 20th and was well-attended.
- We had 57 passengers on eight Lake Cruises (pontoon boat) this month. Steve piloted the boat and

had such a blast with the passengers that he wants to switch to that job. Cruises will continue for the first two weekends in November.

- Our Second Chance Tournament was held on the 5th.
 Jeremy Blackwell, of Burlington, claimed the right to join the BBT Fish-Off.
- The same Jeremy Blackwell (coming out of the Second Chance Tournament) won the BBT Fish-Off on the 12th with a 6.90-pound bass. Curtis Rippey (5.62 lbs.) and Keith Patterson (4.56 lbs.) took Second and Third.
- The lake water level ended at full pool; though we recorded little rain in the month.
- In November, we move to weekends-only, 8am-5pm, and are closed in December and January.







Fall Programs

Fall athletics is underway with soccer and flag football season in full swing. We saw an increase overall in registration numbers from last fall; though 5U and 6U soccer decreased. The age divisions we saw the biggest jumps were 8U (flag football and soccer) and 14U soccer. 14U soccer was the biggest jump going from 3 teams to 5 teams this fall.
